Dear Dad;

Last night I received a letter from both you and Mother, dated July 29th and 30th, I am very sorry to hear about you not receiving my mail, as I have sent dozens of letters direct to home all of the boys are kicking because their mail is not being received properly at home.

There is some talk of some of the mail being destroyed, I am getting your mail quite regularly, about every four days, receiving a couple of letters.

I can't account for you not receiving any, never mind, it will soon be straightened out.

I am directing this letter right to you for a change, thanks for the paper. In my last letter I spoke about writing to Mr. Alexander, I wrote him a very nice long letter, I sincerely hope he receives it. If he does Dad, let me know because I suppose he will let you read it.

Yesterday, in my letter I covered nearly everything so I will close.

Tell the neighbors I appreciate very much, the meeting they held, and am glad, Dad, you and Mother took such a fine part in it. Give my love to everybody, and hope the dogs are well,
