Yesterday received a very nice letter from Cousin Nelson, it was a very nice letter, I am very glad to hear he is coming along so nicely.

I suppose by this time tomorrow, you will be on your way home to dear old 3423- after all said and done, that is the coziest little place for the Munder family on the C. W. side, get me?

Little Nelson tells me you received a letter from me, I thought it was about time. All our fellows received complaints from home of not receiving any mail from June 18th to July 31st. after that some of the parents received as high as five letters together, in one week.

You certainly should get a bunch from me, as I wrote at least twice a week, and now considerably more. I most assuredly get your mail all right and O. K.

Up to this date I have received no papers, and no magazines, but I suppose you have not received my letter asking for them. I explained about being allowed to send second class mail across in my two letters before this, pass it along.

Now as news is very scarce I am going to close. I hope by now you are receiving my mail quite regularly, as I am not neglecting it. Remember me to everybody.
