January 20th, 1918.

Dear Mother;

Although there is some more mail tonight I am going to mail this now. I generally like to wait if possible for your letters in case there is something to be answered in it. As yet the eats have not arrived but I suppose it will come soon.

Yesterday I went into town with Lieutenant Kemp. We had supper at the Plaza Hotel and then took in a Vaudville Show. We got back to camp about 12.45 and you may be sure I slept fine. We do not have to get up on Sunday so I missed breakfast and layed late.

Enclosed you will find a couple of good comedies rather one and a sick report of our camp which is very comforting. I received a letter from Mary stating about those trunks. I wish you would go up and tell her what I wrote. She said she could get one for seven dollars. If Dad still wants to make me a locker. I am contented if not tell Gen. to send me one at once.

My cold is much better so don't worry.
