In this mornings mail received the package. It was very fine and I had the cinnamon buns for supper with a cup of cocco. I save half for my breakfast.

Tomorrow night I am on Guard. I get Guard every fourth day. I do not mind it anymore as I am getting use to it. Thanks to the Marshmallow cream my cold is much better. I am very glad you sent the ginger cakes they are fine and I love them. Everything in the box was in a number one condition and as usual packed wonderfully.

Last night I had a compliment paid me which I appreciated

Bugler with the Artillery men. He must have been playing crap, that is he told me so, because one of my friends came up to me and said, Munder you weren't in the Guard House, on such and such a date, and I said No. He said, I am glad to hear that as I saw one of our Buglers playing crap and I new you didn't and felt surprised as I knew you were on Guard. He said, I thought you were above playing that and am gladyou have not changed. I thought that spoke pretty good for my reputation, what say you?
