



OUR AHCE

In 1999, Secretary of the Army Louis Caldera committed the U.S. Army to "the establishment of an Academic Research Facility and Army Museum at the U.S. Army War College, Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania."

In that same year, the Army Heritage Center Foundation incorporated under its legal name Military Heritage Foundation.

We preserve the memories of soldiers and their families, honor their service, and educate the public on the contributions of soldiers and the U.S. Army to our nation's history. For more than 25 years, the U.S. Army Heritage and Education Center has been the primary--but not the only-beneficiary of our philanthropic contributions.




Our battlefield and leadership ride program began in 2017. The Commander of 2nd ROTC Brigade based in Fort Dix, NJ asked us to design a curriculum for an unfunded--but required--ROTC program: the Senior Cadet Staff Ride. In collaboration with Dr. Carol Reardon, George Winfree Professor Emerita of American History at The Pennsylvania State University, we developed an immersive learning experience in which ROTC cadets engage with the concepts of leadership and military operations by analyzing decision-making during battle. Cadets who participated in our staff rides explored how human beings act in times of crises and why adaptation to changing conditions is essential by applying the lessons of Gettysburg and Antietam to situations they will face as future Army officers.

Over the years, we adapted the Cadet Staff Ride model for executive management and leadership development training, drawing on our strong relationships with experienced military leaders, historians, and authors.

OUR BATTLEFIELD RIDE FRAMEWORK

We believe a staff ride is more than a battlefield tour. Historical battlefields are laboratories of leadership. Engaging with the lessons of the battlefield immerses us in an illustrative, complex experience that helps us understand how humans act in times of crisis, how adaptation to changing conditions is essential, and how leadership matters. In battle, leaders make rapid decisions with incomplete information and high stakes. Studying those decisions—why they were made, how they succeeded or failed—provides a framework to discuss the internal and external challenges we face as individuals or as organizational leaders.

Further, and more intimately tied to our mission of preserving soldier stories, each battle represents thousands of individual acts of courage, endurance, loss, and love of country. Conscious, deliberate memory becomes a form of stewardship–protecting their legacy for future generations. By applying their experiences to the contemporary day, we ensure the lessons of the men and women who served are not lost to time.

MISSION ALIGNMENT

Connecting past soldiers' experiences to participants' modern responsibilities and battlefield lessons to our organizational values.



HISTORICAL AND CONTEXTUAL INTEGRITY

Battlefield lessons are based on primary sources from multiple perspectives in a way that helps us understand why decisions were made in their time before drawing modern parallels.



LEADERSHIP RELEVANCE AND TRANSFERABILITY

We emphasize critical moments of leadership judgment, adaptability, or communication through a variety of leadership styles to show how those same principles apply in business, civic, or nonprofit settings.



EXPERIENTIAL AND REFLECTIVE LEARNING

Our facilitators use the physical battlefield environment to spark empathy and perspective-taking. They encourage participants to visualize terrain, sound, and human experience to feel leadership pressure.



EMOTIONAL AND ETHICAL DEPTH

Battlefield scenarios will encourage reflection on duty, loyalty, and conscience to help us examine modern questions of responsibility and integrity.

OUR METHOD

This guide is designed for leaders, professionals, and citizens who want to explore how the lessons of the past illuminate the challenges of leadership today.

At Antietam commanders faced uncertainty, moral complexity, and the limits of communication. This experience invites us to ask: What would I have done? What do these choices teach us about leading today?

Site selection prioritizes safe, accessible battlefields with interpretive infrastructure.

We designed this battlefield ride for diverse audiences and learning styles. Over the course of your time with us, you will experience:

- Progressive complexity that begins with clear, relatable stories before tackling abstract theory.
- The use of visual and spatial tools such as maps and diagrams to show maneuver and consequence.
- Psychological safety that ensures we will facilitate discussion respectfully because combat stories can evoke strong emotions.
