UNITS-Designated Airborne Divisions, 1942-46.

Of the ten possible airborne divisions, we have historical data cards on the 11th, 13th, 15th and 17th Airborne Divisions, prepared by The Adjutant General's Office (TAGO Set No 3, Reel #1, Microfilm). My search failed to uncover similar cards on the 6th, 9th, 18th, 19th, 21st, 80th, and 108th Airborne Divisions. Those units, apparently, were not activated as airborne divisions. The 80th Infantry Division, for example, activated during World War II was re-designated airborne in 1946, while in inactive status. The 108th Airborne Division was constituted and activated that same year. Reference:

UNITS-2ND Airborne Brigade

HQ & HQ CO, 2nd Airborne Brigade, was activated Jul 1943 at Camp Mackall. On 14 Jan 1944, with George P. Howell in command, it was attached to the 82nd Airborne Division, serving as an intermediary headquarters element between the division and two attached parachute infantry regiments - the 507th and 508th. The brigade fought at Normandy and apparently received no other campaign participation credit.

The 82nd Division departed France on 19 Jul and did not re-enter the combat zone until 17 Sep, when it dropped into Holland as part of **MARKET GARDEN**. No references to the 2d Brigade in that operation were found, but it has official credit for participating in two campaigns: Normandy and Rhineland (15 Sep - 21 Mar 1945). Records in the Organizational History Branch, Center of Military History, reveal the 2d Brigade formally disbanded 15 Jan 1945. See:
