**NOTE:** The Surgeon General reported (<u>WD Annual Report, 1917</u>, Vol. I, p. 483) two categories of casualties in the Mexican Punitive Expedition:

gunshot wounds -- 107 cases, of which 40 died. in-action wounds -- 32 cases, of which 26 died.

Presumably, the 107 wounds were "<u>out</u>-of-action" cases of US troops shooting themselves each other by accident or otherwise. If thus interpreted, does this mean there were over 3 times as many casualties caused by friendly fire as by enemy fire?
