CIVIL WAR-Training

According to Francis A. Lord, They Fought for the Union, cited above, p. 30, many cavalrymen trained without benefit of horses at the beginning of their service and drilled on foot to infantry tactics. Standardized training of horsemen never fully evolved. Of pertinent manuals authorized by the U.S. War Dept, the following were most prominent:

Cooke, Philip St. George. Cavalry Tactics, Or Regulations for the Instruction, Formations and Movements of the Cavalry of the Army and Volunteers of the United States, cited above. UE15.R63.

Adopted by cavalry units in the West; official adoption by War Dept, 1 Nov 1864.

General treatise in common use.

Known as the "41 Tactics" or "Poinsett Tactics" essentially a translation from French sources. Used by Eastern cavalry throughout the war and Western units until autumn 1864.

NOTE: U.S. HORSE CAVALRY, WWII: WISHFUL THINKING?

One of the Army Ground Forces observers in the Mediterranean Theater solicited opinions on the feasibility of horse cavalry and pack animals for the ongoing Italian campaign. COL T.Q. Donaldson, Jr. (Cavalry) sent questionnaires to at least seven division and corps commanders and then incorporated their responses into his reports. See the AGF Mediterranean Theater Observer Board Reports (D766.82U5.1942-45), Vols. 8 & 9, specifically these individual reports:
