SHANGHAI VOLUNTEER CORPS 1853-1941

Our meager pertinent sources indicate the Shanghai Volunteer Corps was established in 1853 by agreement among American, British and French trade delegations residing in that city. The resultant international defense organization acted as municipal militia for the international community in Shanghai, and eventually had representation from twenty nationalities, including a Russian contingent. The corps mobilized a number of times, usually in response to riots but sometimes to augment the regular foreign garrisons or expeditionary forces, such as during the Tai Ping Rebellion, 1860-1862, and the Boxer Rebellion of 1900. The Japanese disbanded the corps during their WWII occupation of the city.
