NOTE: REGULAR ARMY PARTICIPATION

Letters in Vol. 17 of Papers of Alexander Hamilton (E302.H247) indicate that about 200 US troops destined for Carlisle needed forage straw and fuel. (Letter from Hamilton, 15 Sep 1794, pp. 236-37).

Two other letters, pp. 248-49 & 254-55, refer to Lt Daniel Bissel commanding a detachment of "Troops of the United States" and also "Continental," which had escorted artillery & stores from Lancaster, PA, to Williamsport, MD, and were then detained for service in Samuel Smith's brigade of Maryland militia. Bissel's unit, apparently, was already at Bedford, PA, in the rebel area.

At that time, the US Army had been restructured into the Legion of the United States.
