### WWII-US Army Policy

In 1937, US Army policy had been made clear regarding aliens: none would be enlisted and those currently serving had to become naturalized within three years. See:

However, the wartime manpower needs of the nation forced a change. The Second War Powers Act required all aliens to register for the draft. See:

#### Aliens and the U.S. Army

The Enemy Alien Internment Program, 1941-46 involved 8 camps operated by the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), which imprisoned over 31,000 enemy aliens, including 5,000 Japanese-Americans who had renounced their American citizenship. See:
