13-STAR U.S. FLAG

Thirteen-star flags were official from 1777 to 1795. Page 9 of <u>DA Pamphlet 360-501</u> portrays a widely accepted style. For other styles, consult the book by Grace Cooper, p. 11 of which indicates earliest usage of the 13-star circle in 1792. During the Constitutional period, the common arrangement was either 3-2-3-2-3 or 4-5-4 (see pp. 3 & 10).

DISPOSAL OF U.S. FLAG

According to Flags and Guidons: Army Regulation 840-10, 23 Aug 1962, Para 116:

When a flag is in such a condition that it is no longer a fit emblem for display, it will not be cast aside nor used in any way that might be viewed as disrespectful. If not will be destroyed as a whole, privately [underlining added], preferably by burning or by some other method lacking in any suggestion of irreverence or disrespect to it as a military emblem.

Sources below agree the disposition must be respectful, with burning the preferred manner. The Commerce Dept's publication and the Army Reg further specify the flag be destroyed "as a whole." Neither the <u>U.S. Code</u> nor the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's bulletin specify the disposal be done privately. See:
