NOTE: US ARMY NURSES IN OCCUPATION OF KOREA

Some may have accompanied the initial U.S. occupation force, the 40th Infantry Division, in mid-Sep 1945. Its attachments included the 20th & 21st Portable Surgical Hospitals. (See 40th Division Unit History).

In Korea, <u>Strength of the Army Reports</u> record the following combined totals for nurses, dieticians, and physical therapists:

184 - 30 Oct 1945

172 - 30 May 1946

By Sep 1946, the 6th & 7th Infantry Divisions became the occupying force, according to the <u>Directory & Station Lists</u>, and included the following in-country hospitals:

34th General Hospital (750 beds)

71st (250)

377th (250)

396th (100)
