SULFA DRUGS

Sulfonamides, available since the mid-1930s, became widely used in the U.S. Army during WWII. Each individual soldier's first aid kit contained a package of sulfa powder (sulfanilamide) for dusting on open wounds and a package of sulfa tablets (sulfadiazine) for swallowing after being wounded. In Mar 1945, use of sulfa powder ceased, except by Medical Dept officers, because of its ineffectiveness in major bleeding wounds (it washed out) and its hindrance to the healing of minor wounds. See <u>War Department Circular 77</u>, 10 Mar 1945, Sec II, and the first aid manual (<u>FM 21-11</u>, Aug 1946, p. 11). The latter describes sulfa tablets but not sulfa powder.
