(OFFICERS' COMPENSATION FOR SERVANTS, 1846-48)

The rate of compensation appears to have been initially fixed by Act of 24 Apr 1816, which prescribed a servant's compensation be equal to the pay and allowances of a private soldier. Thus, servants pay varied as did the pay of privates of infantry or cavalry, \$7.00 and \$8.00, respectively, in 1838. Additional allowances for servants included a per-month increment of \$2.50 for clothing, beginning in 1827. There is no indication that these rates changed until 1854. See:

(SOLDIER PAY, CIVIL WAR)

From 1857 through Aug 1861, basic monthly pay of an infantry private was \$11.00. From Apr 1861 to June 1864, the amount increased to \$13.00. From Jun 1864 to war's end, it rose to \$16.00. See:

(COMPARISON OF BRITISH AND US PAY)

The U.S. soldier received a substantially higher rate of pay than his British counterpart during the Second World War. See the comparison in Norman Longmate's <u>The G.I.'s: The Americans in Britain, 1942-1945</u> (NY: Scribner's, 1975), pp. 377-79. Also see contemporaneous pay tables in these documents:

During the war, neither US Rangers nor British Commandos received any additional pay specifically for their special service or for hazardous duty. Although certain allowances were provided during their training periods, the base pay rates of these volunteers were the same as indicated in the pay tables. A twenty percent increase applied to all U.S. troops serving overseas and individual British troops could receive higher pay for earning tradesmen ratings. See:

As far as can be determined from our sources, the respective pay rates applicable to US and British soldiers remained in effect when a unit was attached to the forces of another nation. For example, in the 1st Special Service Force, comprised of American and Canadian volunteers, the difference in pay scales - higher for U.S. personnel -- contributed to morale problems among the Canadian personnel. However, since the Canadians were paid twice a month and the Americans but once, perhaps the pay differential within the unit was somewhat lessened. See:
