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NOTE: The history of sabotage seems to be intertwined with the histories of espionage, subversion, resistance movements and related subjects. As an independent subject, sabotage appears chiefly in literature of the World War II and postwar years, which focuses largely on preventive measures. See, for example, the bibliography compiled by Dorothy C. Tompkins, "Sabotage and Its Prevention During Wartime" a mimeographed booklet prepared at the University of California, Berkeley, in 1951 (53 pages; Z7164S3T6.1951). After the 1950s, sabotage apparently joined the new subject of "unconventional warfare," and is now most often found in the history of guerrilla warfare.

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
